was lucky when I bought my

place in Longoio back in 2005 to also have two ornamental trees included in my small garden: a Japanese maple, which turns a flaming red in autumn, and an evergreen camellia which, come wind and rain, produces red and white flowers by February. This year, the flowers have arrived later because of the cold weather and only now can they be appreciated in their loveliness. To see the camellia bloom

Camellias originate in eastern and southern Asia and were introduced into Europe during the eighteenth century. The tea plant is a member of the camellia family and, indeed, the expansion of the tea trade enabled many new varieties to be brought into Europe. Hybridization did the rest.

after the monotone rigours of winter truly

brings hope into one's heart.

Every March at Pieve and Sant'Andrea di Compito, by the slopes of the Monte Pisano south of Lucca, there is a camellia festival where one can fully appreciate the variety of flower forms and colours of this perfume-less plant. A shuttle bus takes you to the camellias – this is the only way to get there, as the narrow roads would otherwise soon be clogged up with private cars! The Camellarium is spectacular at this time, the mill-stream walk is delightful, the exhibitions are most informative, there are many stalls selling local products, and there are also musical events. (Last time I heard a delightful recital on the harp.)

But why was this area chosen for camellias? The fact is that the climate is ideal for them. The English ex-pats of the nineteenth century, escaping from the torrid summer of the Tuscan plains, discovered this and introduced the camellia to these hills. Indeed, dotted around the Compitese hills are many aristocratic villas complete with their luscious camellias and there is even a society dedicated to old varieties of camellias in Lucca province.




If you fancy your cup of tea, not only can you buy delicious camellia tea but you can even have the ultimate Italian invention: camellia-tea flavoured ice-cream!

Camellia Festival

his year the event's highlight will be the *Camelieto*, which houses around a thousand camellias varieties and has received a "Garden of Excellence" award. There will be entry to historic villas and their gardens, food and wine testing and purphesing. Japaneses and

food and wine tasting and purchasing, Japanese and Korean tea ceremonies, ancient 'Temari' folk art and extempore painting.





The Ancient Camellias of the Lucca area exhibition is on the weekends of 10/11, 17/18, and 24/25 March, as well as Easter weekend, 31 March and 1/2 April, with opening times from 10 am to 6 pm. You must board a free shuttle bus to the Borgo delle Camelie from the Frantoio Sociale del Compitese (Via di Tiglio, 609) parking lot. Free access for children under 12 and disabled persons with a guide. Tickets are $\[mathbb{c}$ 7. For a few euros more you can buy a ticket which includes admission to the exhibition and the park of Villa Reale, reachable with your own transport.

n the heart of Florence, near the Ponte Vecchio, there stands the beautiful church of Santo Stefano al Ponte. The church was originally constructed around the twelfth century in Romanesque style,

but in the fourteenth century the exterior was renovated, and between 1631 and 1655 the interior was also renovated to convert the three original aisles into an open hall. A masterpiece of architecture, the church houses important artwork such as the Buontalenti staircase with a marmoreal balustrade of 1575. The magnificently decorated place is worth a visit, even more so, if you consider that it is presently used as a concert hall where, believe it or not, you can attend concerts of *The Three Tenors*!

Inspired by the world-renowned three tenors Luciano Pavarotti, Placido Domingo and José Carreras, and as a tribute to Luciano Pavarotti, the concert regularly held in the church features opera arias from *La Traviata*, *Rigoletto*, *Tosca* and Neapolitan songs. Three masterful tenors, Claudio Sassetti, Mattia Nebbiai and Leonardo Sgroi, are accompanied by a chamber ensemble of mandolin, cello and grand piano. The beauty and the excellent acoustics of the auditorium enhance the superb quality of the music, making the experience truly magical.

One of the three tenors, Claudio Sassetti, is from Bagni di Lucca. After graduating from the *Istituto Musicale Luigi Boccherini* he started a brilliant concert and operatic career. Since then, he has sung all over Italy, with a wide repertoire of roles, in operas primarily by Puccini and Donizetti but also by Pergolesi, Rossini, Verdi, Mozart and even Britten. As early as 2001, he performed in front of the Belgian queen, on the occasion of the *International European Museum of the Year Award*. Mestro Sassetti has also featured in Monteverdi's *Coronation of Poppea*, broadcast by the national TV channel Rai 2. In the Spring of 2016,

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love gardens. Some of my strongest travel memories include gardens that evoke specific times and places. I remember vividly a small herb garden in Uzes, France, a coastal garden in Maine, the unique Japanese Garden in Portland, Oregon, and the incomparable gardens of Villa Balbianello at Lake Como in northern Italy.

But my absolute favorite garden memories come from Lucca and the gardens of Palazzo Pfanner. The palazzo, which dates from the mid-1600s, has a large entry courtyard and a remarkable staircase, beyond which lie the gardens. It amazes me to know that members of the Pfanner family, who have owned the property since the mid 1800s, still have apartments in the palazzo. Imagine living within such beauty! Imagine too that at one time (around 1900) the family ran a brewery and beer garden here.

I've been fortunate to experience the garden in the three seasons it is open – spring, summer and fall (it's closed to visitors in winter). Each season has its own flavor as plants bud, bloom, set fruit, mature, and fade. In spring, the lemon trees blossom in their terracotta pots and are full of mature fruit. Irises poke up around the fountain, the giant magnolia tree blooms, and the smallest of buds appear on rows of hydrangea (called *hortensia* in Italian). In summer, roses and peonies dazzle and pots of geraniums flower. The summer hydrangeas are spectacular with huge flower heads in pinks, blues, and purples. In fall, the hydrangeas begin to fade but are still beautiful, even into late September/early October. The lemon trees in fall are full of small, green fruit. The vines begin to change color and there are still some roses in bloom. The fall weather is ideal for sitting in the garden, a perfect season for reading or daydreaming in this peaceful place.







The limonaia in fall usually stands empty, waiting for the arrival of the potted lemon trees to winter over. This fall there was an art exhibit in the limonaia, which gave me the chance to walk through the low brick and stone building with its graceful arched, green windows.

Some things in the garden remain constant – the green of the boxwood and laurel hedges, the tall bamboo mini-forest, the vine-covered walls of old brick, and the statues representing the four seasons and Olympic gods. Most constant of all is the fountain, with its large octagonal basin, dramatic statuary, and seasonal flowers. This is the centerpiece of the garden; its sound infuses the space with a sense of calm and timelessness.

For garden lovers this is a "can't miss" experience in Lucca. The palazzo and garden can be seen from *le mura* (the walls) but are best experienced by entering the garden itself. *Quando sono nel giardino di Palazzo Pfanner, sono contenta* (when I'm in the garden of Palazzo Pfanner, I'm happy).

his brand-new festival was founded by American expat Shimon Shemtov and grew out of a series of English cultural events provided by his Pisa-based school, New York English Academy.

The festival will focus on a different culture each ITALY year but will always be based in the ever-popular region of Tuscany, Italy. For this year we already have the participation of more than 15 leading institutions in Pisa, Lucca and Florence.

This year's edition will focus on the U.S.A., specifically Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., since April 4, 2018 will be the 50th anniversary of his death. The actual anniversary is a Wednesday, and we will have some events on that day as well, but the main events will take place on the following weekend, April 6-8, 2018.

Each year the festival will be divided into 3 sections: Reflection, Celebration, and Innovation.

Reflection will look back at the history of each year's chosen culture and reflect on what happened, refresh our memories and refine our knowledge. In this year's edition we will learn more about the events of 1968, MLK's life, his writings, speeches, his international impact, etc. We will have documentary screenings. readings, talks, discussions, workshops (artistic, theatrical and cinematic) for children, teenagers and adults. In addition to focusing on Dr. King's 'I have a dream', we would like to focus primarily on 'What is <u>your</u> dream?', encouraging people of all ages to think about what kind of world they would love to live in and, perhaps most importantly, what they are willing to do for it.

The second section, Celebration, will celebrate the beauty of each year's culture in the form of concerts, theater, poetry, cinema, etc. So this year we will have movies on the subject of MLK and civil rights, Jazz and Gospel concerts, theater performances, and much more.

The third section is *Innovation*, where we will look forward and try to take what we have learned from the past and apply it to the future in very specific,

concrete, realistic ways. In addition to talks by prominent thinkers of various nationalities and backgrounds, we will have a competition where everyone will be invited to Submit an idea; perhaps we will even open it up to the world at some point but for now it will certainly be open to all of Italy. The winners will be awarded prizes of various

types and sizes; this year's Grand Prize, sponsored by New York English Academy, will be a free round-trip ticket to New York.

We hope to conclude the entire festival on Sunday evening, where people will gather in Pisa, Lucca and Florence, to show their support for human equality and inclusiveness. One symbolic gesture we are planning to express the concepts of diversity, hope and action is for people to write their dreams and commitments on variously-colored helium balloons which we will then release simultaneously, as a kind of communal prayer, but also as a sign of commitment to a brighter, more colorful – read diverse – future.

We believe that these images have the potential to inspire people, particularly young people, and send the important message to people around the world that there are hundreds of thousands of people in Italy who still believe in these values and are prepared to take action to protect and nurture them. If other cities around the world would like to join this gesture, and we believe that they will,

We were warmed by many displays of this type from around the world and we would like to send the signal back and create a sort of large international conversation of optimism which we hope will dwarf, if not silence, the aggressive heart-breaking images that we are being bombarded with daily. Symbolism is only

symbolism, but we believe that negative symbolism must be answered with positive symbolism – and we feel as though this can be the perfect playful conclusion to the 5-day festival of intensive, in-depth, Reflection, Celebration and Innovation.

Laura Ziegler, Retrospective

here are times when words seem totally inadequate. That's how I feel when contemplating these tiny sculptures by Laura Ziegler, on display from


3 March to 22 April, 3.30 pm to 7.30 pm daily (except Mondays) at the Fondazione Banca del Monte di Lucca Exposition Hall, Piazza San Martino 7 (free admission). The exhibit is beautifully curated by Maria Stuarda Varetti, with a catalog from Maria Pacini Fazzi Editore (photos by Lucio Ghilardi) presenting the sculptures viewed from all sides, as indeed they should be seen. The exhibit includes many sketches, including self-

portraits. Among the sculptures are charming little dogs rolled up cozily, as dogs do. But mostly there are people, real people.

Laura Ziegler's polychrome sculptures date from 1949, when she began studying at age 22 under the Fulbright Fellowship program in Rome with Pericle Fazzini, and she continued creating these almost until her final days, in May last year. Her studio in Pietrasanta and her home at San Michele in Escheto (Lucca) were filled with tiny figures exuding vitality and emotion. If they weren't in fact pushing their bodies against the elements, they were conveying energy through facial expressions. I almost expected them to leap off the grand piano and begin dancing, sometimes impishly, around her home.

Laura succeeded in selling her works as soon as she began showing them in the 1950s in New York City and Washington, D.C. She exhibited at the Venice Biennale in 1956 and 1958, at the Hirshhorn Museum and Sculpture Garden in Washington, D.C., at the MoMA Gallery in New York City, and at the Columbus (Ohio) Gallery of Art in her hometown. Because of her artistic empathy, she was invited to create portrait sculptures of many well-known personalities, including Gore Vidal, Zero Mostel, and Isaac Bashevis Singer, and of musicians who she met with her husband of over sixty years, tenor and conductor Herbert Handt, well known in Lucca for having created the Associazione





In addition to the precious gems on display here in Lucca, Laura Ziegler also made monumental sculptures, such as the 18-foot steel and Plexiglas cross (1951) at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church at Ohio State University, The Burning Bush (1959) at Temple Israel in Columbus, and others in the Hirshhorn Museum in Washington. But it is in the smaller pieces, often no larger than the palm of her hand, that I can feel the magic most vividly.

The Sign of the Avant-garde: The Futurists and Engraving

he Fondazione Ragghianti, one of Europe's most important art research centers, is currently (23 February to 15 April) offering a historic exhibition curated by Giorgio Marini and Francesco Parisi. The exhibition presents almost 150 artworks, extending from the late 1800s to the post-war period. Futurism came to a halt in 1944, with the death of its founder, Filippo Tommaso Marinetti, and the end to a disastrous world war.

The artists on exhibit are: Umberto Boccioni, Carlo Carrà, Gino Severini, Luigi Russolo, Thayaht, Mario Sironi, Ardengo Soffici, Fortunato Depero, Enrico Prampolini, Romolo Romani, Primo Conti, Giorgio Morandi, Osvaldo Bot, Antonio Marasco, Duilio Cambellotti, Achille Lega, Giannetto Maimerendi, Alberto Martini, Emilio Notte, Anselmo Bucci, Roberto Iras Baldessari, Carlo Erba, Francesco Dal Pozzo, Lorenzo Viani and Renato Di Bosso.

The exhibition is presented in three rooms, with the first

dedicated to Symbolism, the second to Pre-Futurism, and the third to Futurism. Following these is another smaller room dedicated to publications containing original graphic art, such as self-produced catalogs and illustrated books. Descriptive panels offer synthetic and useful introductions (in Italian), while the artworks themselves are impressive and intriguing, inviting close examination.



The Futurist movement has been well-studied, though until now little attention has been given to the connection of this movement to the techniques of engraving. Wood and linoleum were considered ideal materials both for their immediacy and ease of carving, and for their basis in Futurist values of anti-elitism and anti-intellectualism, in contrast to the late Romantic period (such as the English pre-Raphaelites). According to Futurist artist and





theoretician Umberto Boccioni, Futurist art offers the inside and the outside ... in simultaneous interpenetration, synthesis of colour and shape, dynamismsubject-plastic state of mind. Many of the works on display here

show these features, similar to the figureground (or dreamlike) ambiguity being explored by psychologists at that time.

Who was Marinetti and what led him to create the Futurist movement?

Born in Egypt to Italian parents, Marinetti took an early interest in poetry, encouraged by his mother. Already in Egypt he was a bit of a rebel, at 17 publishing scandalous novels by Emile Zola. This was not appreciated by the Jesuits at the school where he was studying. His parents then sent him to study at the Sorbonne in Paris (where he was influenced by Mallarmé and D'Annunzio), after which he went to the University of Pavia to study law, choosing instead to become a writer, art critic and publisher in Milan. In 1909, the Paris newspaper Le Figaro published his Manifesto di Futurismo, espousing the values of rupture with the past, glorification of speed (especially the automobile), and virility. Patriotism and fascism appealed to him; in fact in 1915 he published a book of poems entitled War the Only Hygiene of the World -! Among other strange ideas, Marinetti condemned pasta, complaining that it created lassitude and pessimism and weakened the Italian character; he recommended that Italians eat locally-grown rice instead. (Look up Futurist cooking on internet for more of his creative ideas about food.) Marinetti participated in various military exploits, winning medals for his bravery, before dying of heart failure at Bellagio (Lake Como) in 1944.

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
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
Lucca's Fantastic *Mercatini* and where to find them

It is especially in these streets and beautiful squares that at different times of the year Lucca hosts its picturesque mercatini. It may be useful then to have a small calendar in which all events are organised.

3) Mercato dell'Antiquariato. The third weekend of each month this amazing antique market takes place in the old town, hosting antique dealers from Tuscany and also other regions of Italy. It is known for its amazing antique furniture placed in the streets to be admired. It's even possible to find jewellery dating back to the early 20th century. Take a look at the old photographs from the 19th century. This market really does sell pieces of history!



2) Mercato Contadino, each Saturday in the Foro Boario. This market based on local and biological products is offered only by local farmers, in respect of tradition and typical products.




4) Arti e Mestieri, the last weekend of each month in piazza San Giusto. In this exhibition and market, local potters, painters, sculptors, and those who work with leather, glass, fabrics, and metals display their creations.

8) Mercatino del Settembre Lucchese. 13 September is the most important date of the year for the citizenry of Lucca, when the sacred procession of

the Volto Santo takes place. At this time is the Mercatino in Piazza Napoleone (and also in Borgo Giannotti), which lasts for a week.





9) Lucca Comics and Games, an international fair at the end of October/beginning of November, features markets, games, and exhibitions throughout town, with lots of people old and young from all over Europe dressed in wonderful costumes.



6) Fiera di Santa Zita. During the same period (27 of April) as the commemoration of Saint Zita (the patroness of housekeepers, bakers, and Lucca itself) this exhibition-market takes place in Piazza dell' Anfiteatro. Exhibitors from all over Tuscany show their amazing flowers and ornamental plants.



10) Il Desco: Sapori e Saperi Lucchesi, a market dedicated to Lucca and its local products, takes place during the last days of November and the beginning of December.



7) Murabilia, an exhibition market about gardening, takes place during the first weekend of September on the walls of Lucca, at Baluardo San Regolo and Baluardo la Libertà. This is one of the most important Italian exhibitions dedicated to plants, flowers and gardening.



11) Mercatino di Natale Starting at the end of November and continuing until January, Piazza Napoleone hosts the holiday markets. This isn't very different from any other mercatino. But usually there are charity stands and we all know that generosity makes you a happier person!

Ivana and the Secret Recipe

to visit my neighbour Ivana on an unexpectedly rainy day she had all her photo albums out on the table, and she showed me pictures of her son's and daughter's confirmation (how little 'angels' grow up to be perfectly ordinary human beings...), and of her grandparents, while her husband Doriano sat

silently in an armchair nearby, having 'posed' uncertainly for a photo

Ivana said her maternal grandmother Adele had una storia brutta. When she was pregnant her Belgian husband went back to Belgium and did not return for 23 years. When he did finally return, Ivana herself was just born. He adored his granddaughter and wanted to take her back to Belgium with him, but you can guess what the answer to that one was. Adele took her husband back anyway. There must be another story there, but perhaps now no longer remembered.

Ivana's paternal grandmother Maria had a happier story. She was married for many years to someone who kept sheep. She had nine children, so the bigger ones looked after the little ones. There is a precious picture of *le* due nonne together with Ivana's brother and his wife on their wedding day.

Ivana explained that Adele was senza lavoro. I suggested that being a lone parent was quite enough work... She never knew, of course, if or when her errant

husband might return. She would walk up into the mountains to collect wild strawberries and raspberries to sell in town, walking on foot from Pegnana where she lived all her life, with baskets of wood to sell where she was able. This was the life of a contadina, but one made much harder as she did it largely on her own for so long. She weathered the war (as did many others) and one of her

favourite things was to have all the relations round for a big meal, when she really pushed the boat out on the food front.

Ivana's normal diet consisted largely of polenta, but it was a different story on these special days, which Ivana still remembers.







They would eat tortelli, which Adele made at home, with a delicious sauce made of pieces of chicken and rabbit mixed together, all stirred into a brodo made from the giblets of both rabbit and chicken, with l'herbe dei campi (probably nepitella, known in English as calamint, was one of these, though I forgot to ask at the time), and onions, celery and garlic.

There would be a mixture of beaten eggs and cheese on top to make a sort of crust as it went into the oven, and tomatoes if there were any. It was indeed a tasty dish, using all she had saved by being so frugal the rest of the time.

But the highpoint of the meal was Nonna's torta di noci.... Ivana laughed when I asked her whether she knew how Adele made it. She said it was so delicious that Adele never told anyone the recipe for it! After her hard life this was at least one thing that she could keep precious for herself, perhaps. So we'll have to be content with a modern version. Adele's secret went with her to

Torta di Noci

You need 125g of flour (rice flour would be good), 125g of corn-flour, 150g of sugar, 80g of butter, 3 egg yolks, 250g of toasted walnuts, 2 dessert-spoons of oil, a glass of Nocino liqueur (where did poor Adele get that from?).... Nocino is a sticky dark brown liqueur made from unripe green walnuts. After steeping them in spirit, the walnuts are removed and the now-black alcohol is mixed with a simple syrup. Nocino has an aromatic, but bittersweet, flavor. It may indeed be homemade; villages and even individual families often had their own recipes, as Adele probably did....

SO back to the recipe: You also need a packet each of yeast and vanilla essence, and some icing sugar to dust the top of the finished cake. And how do you make

this delightful confection? Beat the egg yolks and the sugar together, add the chopped roasted nuts, then the oil and the butter, the liqueur, and the vanilla essence. Combine the flour, yeast, and corn-flour, mixing thoroughly, then mix these together with the other ingredients. Bake the cake for about 40 minutes in a medium temperature oven. Eccoci!

Thank you anyway, Adele, and Ivana....

In Homage to Women

ach year for Women's Day Bagni di Lucca outdoes itself with a festival. What makes it even more special is the location, the beautiful, historic Casinò along the river at Ponte a Serraglio (halfway between the train station of Fornoli and the town of Bagni itself). This year the dates are 8 to 17 March, ten days filled with energy to lift our spirits as we head towards springtime.

At the heart of this celebration is an art exhibition (open 4pm to 7pm daily), where professional and amateur artists present works dedicated to the feminine spirit. In addition to talks in Italian focused on women and their rights, women against violence, and women's opinions, this year on 15 March there is an evening in English (with interpretation into Italian by Francis Pettitt), entitled From Magna Carta to *Now: The Struggle for Personhood & the Rights of Woman.* The

Giancarlo Pellegrini, Abstract Expressionist



bstract Expressionism is the school of informal gestural abstraction that came to the front after World War Two. It became an important style in New York and then internationally throughout the fifties. The paintings are strong in colour and brushstroke. They leave a lasting impression on the viewer, resonating self-confidence and energy because of the vigor with which the paints are handled.

Giancarlo Pellegrini, a Lucchese painter, is an abstract expressionist. His heroes are Afro Basaldella (1912-1976), Emilio Vedova (1919-2006), and Jackson Pollack (1912-1956). Pellegrini was born in 1948 in Camaiore and has lived and painted in the historic centre of Lucca his entire adult life. A retrospective exhibit of his painting, beginning with the early 1980s, is being presented at the offices of F.P.M. S.p.A., Via di Mugnano 671, continuing through the month of April. This is across from Fabio Perini S.p.A., Via Giovanni Diodati 50, near the A-11 in Lucca.


